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

The rights of individuals defined in the United Nations convention relating to the status of Refugees and responsibilities of signatories to that convention should be respected and upheld.




Working in partnership with other organisations improves effectiveness and spreads understanding.

OUR STRATEGIC AIMS

1. To improve the quality of life experienced by refugees and asylum seekers in the Berkshire area



2. To maximise the resources available to support refugees and asylum seekers



3. To increase the awareness of the needs of refugees and asylum seekers in the area of benefit



NEARLY 30 YEARS OF CHANGING LIVES.

We celebrated our 25th birthday in June 2020 – 25 years of supporting refugees and asylum seekers in the Berkshire area. The year 2020 was especially challenging due to Covid-19 and the Forbury Gardens tragedy, but we continued to provide support for hundreds of individuals whose needs were exacerbated by the pandemic, and many of the changes we implemented then, are still helping us today .



2021-22 HIGHLIGHTS

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Active pairs meeting on average every week for 1h informal English language sessions at our befriending club. Clients report to have progressed in their spoken language and their understanding, with 65% of those surveyed reporting an increase in confidence too.

Moving our drop-in sessions online has allowed us to reach more people and increased attendance at a challenging time during the pandemic. We have stopped online drop-ins this year and attendances have continued to grow.

OUR RESPONSE TO COVID-19 COST OF LIVING CHALLENGES AHEAD

Covid-19 has hit refugees hard. It exacerbated issues like poor mental health, isolation and poverty that have always made refugees extremely vulnerable, while also interrupting the support activities and networks people relied on.

Across Berkshire, many refugees and asylum seekers have been trapped in their homes for months, lacking internet access or enough money for food, rent and bills. Many have faced worsening anxiety, depression, poverty and health fears on their own.

While the need for support was greater than ever, we were forced to suspend face to face activities and transfer all support services online. Our tireless team of staff and volunteers worked around the clock to adapt our services and provide the support people desperately needed.


We moved our one-to-one English Classes online, shifting them to focus on Befriending to help alleviate isolation. During the first lockdown we were providing 30+ hours of Befriending each week.

We delivered our Drop Ins online with a focus on social interaction, well-being and mindfulness. This included delivering items to grow herbs indoors in partnership with Hempen Farm, and providing yoga classes.

We crowdfunded £23,000 for our Drop In, ensuring it could return as soon as COVID restrictions lift, guaranteeing refugees and asylum seekers have a safe space to meet, make friends and access support for the next two years.

We are extremely grateful to all our wonderful supporters, volunteers and staff that have helped us and as we leave the pandemic behind us, in 2022 we continue to provide support to families and individuals in need during such challenging times as the soaring cost of living hits us all.





ALICE'S STORY

Alice arrived in the UK in 2002 as a refugee from Zimbabwe & later joined by her two daughters. She started volunteering at the Reading Refugee Support Group and became a Chairperson. She helped lead the steering group for the Reading City of Sanctuary and become a trustee and now an Ambassador of the City of Sanctuary UK. Alice has advocated for the plight of refugees, women's rights, human rights and struggles facing BAME people.

Alice worked and studied tirelessly, qualifying as a social worker and now finishing her PhD in Human Geography researching young immigrants while still working to help other refugees.

Alice is a breast cancer survivor, mother, wife, friend, scholar, author, speaker, activist and now an elected Councillor member of Reading Borough Council for Whitley Ward. Alice's resilience and tenacity show the unbelievable accomplishments people can achieve when the barriers to opportunity are challenged and overcome.

OUR IMPACT 2021-2022







Strategic Aim No.1

To improve the quality of life experienced by refugees and asylum seekers in the Berkshire area

We do this by providing direct support and advice and assisting individuals and families to integrate with, contribute to and benefit from the wider community.

WHAT WE DID

Our Actions

- Through the **drop-in centre**, **homework club** and **social activitie**s we support clients to learn skills that **enable independence**, such as obtaining a driving licence, registering for a GP and going shopping.
- We also support our clients through **in-school activities**, by liaising with schools to ensure that children from refugee families are set up with all the necessary resources to help them achieve more at school.



I've gained employment as a waiter and am doing online learning at college. My English language skills are improving through regular informal English support at the RSG drop-in. Being a part of the drop-in community has helped me feel settled in Reading and I enjoy the interaction online.





THE IMPACT

Our Impact

- We are **tracking improved independence**, with the aim to **see reduced isolation** and **loneliness** through helping refugees engage with the community and in school.
- Clients are becoming more independent the longer they are part of RSG, with clients who have been with us between 6m-1year, reporting a 42.2% increase with daily activities they carry out independently and feeling 64% less lonely and isolated.








WHAT WE DID

Our Actions



Prior to Covid-19, RSG's Job Club provided clients with information, tools and resources to help refugees prepare for and find work and volunteering opportunities. The Job Club stopped due to the lockdowns and we hope to restart it, but caseworkers continue to signpost clients to the Jobcentre and other job support services.







THE IMPACT

Our Impact

We aim to support clients to improve their confidence and conversational English, as part of the ability to build their skills. This year we have seen 100% of clients reporting they have increased their overall confidence and their ability to converse in English.

We do not know how many clients report to have been in employment that aligns with their aspirations, compared to last year, or whether satisfaction has increased, due to the challenges of Covid-19 and our employment support service stopping. We aim to improve this over the next year.


Strategic Aim No.2

3. To increase the awareness of the needs of refugees and asylum seekers in the area of benefit

We do this by increasing the profile of the work of RSG and developing a greater understanding of the size and nature of the refugee and asylum seeker population

WHAT WE DID

Our Actions

- We recognize that in partnership with others, we can achieve far more than we could achieve alone. That's why we invite partners to all our events. We engaged with a wide range of stakeholders in the community and broader society, such as the Home Office, Reading College, Red Cross, Deloitte, Reading Borough Council Housing and Jobcentre Plus.
- This year, we ran 7 events, such as our Legal Walk (walking 10km to raise money for our free legal advice services) and the Christmas Appeal, with an average attendance of 53 people.



I've gained employment as a hospital assistant in January and am receiving good pay. I'm also attending a college course and training to be a chef. I've benefited from increased confidence and communication in the drama and writing online and from the community built up in the online drop-in.





THE IMPACT

Our Impact

- This year, 20.5% of campaigns we ran had client participation. We aim to be a user-led organisation and it is important that lived experience informs our public communications and dialogues.
- Our annual event has had an average of 53 people per event attendance, 28 press mentions and our social media following on all 4 platforms (Twitter, Facebook, Instagram and LinkedIn) has increased on average by 392 followers, whilst the Newsletter audience has almost doubled.

OUR IMPROVEMENTS

Whilst we are incredibly proud of the work we do to support asylum seekers and refugees, we recognise we have areas for improvement that will help us continue to grow and improve.

WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE

- This year, there was a 3.5% increase in the number of clients who scored below the UK average for mental wellbeing. We recognise there may have been challenges in terms of making contact and speaking to people due to remote learning and working because of Covid-19 and we will continue to seek ways to successfully engage with our clients and provide support in a way that's right for them.
- Client feedback surveys showed that as a result of our direct support, 39% of clients report they feel they have advanced in their ability to navigate life in the UK independently, e.g., managing public transport confidently.
- From 2021-22, we supported 15 clients into employment. Many people are faced with difficulty in obtaining permission to work.

 Nonetheless, we feel there is significant scope to increase the support RSG offers around gaining employment and will prioritise it in our next Business Plan.
